



Did you know that you can take a tram ride to the top of the **Gateway Arch**? After you squeeze into a futuristic, five-person pod, it takes four minutes to ascend. At the top of the 630-foot-tall monument, small windows reveal unbeatable bird's-eye views.

Below the iconic landmark, the Museum at the Gateway Arch offers a free, innovative and accessible experience, showcasing more than 200 years of St. Louis history. While you're here, check out Cobblestones & Courage, an award-winning 3D movie that transports visitors to the 1850s St. Louis riverfront era.

For the best views of the St. Louis skyline, though, you'll want to climb aboard the **Riverboats at the Gateway Arch.** Cruises are narrated by captains from the National Park Service, who bring the history of the Mississippi River to life!






HISTORY REVISITED

NEW LIFE FOR THE OLD COURTHOUSE

One of the most important historic sites in the U.S., the Old Courthouse reopens this spring after a two-year, multimillion-dollar renovation focused on increased accessibility, structural improvements and new exhibitory.

Topped by an Italian
Renaissance-style, wroughtiron dome, the Old Courthouse
was built between 1839 and
1862, and it heard more than
300 freedom suits, including the
pivotal Dred and Harriet Scott
cases, before the American Civil
War. It's also where Virginia
Minor sued for her right to vote
in Missouri in 1872 – the same
year that Susan B. Anthony was
arrested for trying to vote.

At the Old Courthouse, you can stand where history happened. The new galleries allow visitors to dive deeper into stories of the past, and upcoming exhibits will spotlight the building's architecture, craftsmanship and artistry; explain the importance of courts in our society; and explore the legacy of enslaved individuals seeking freedom in St. Louis.

Host of the nation's second largest Mardi Gras celebration, Soulard also boasts a historic farmers market, a quintessential brewery and a plethora of pubs.





History of the Area

During the last 50 years, the Delmar Loop has evolved into one of the most vibrant and entertaining areas in the US.

1970s

The revitalization of The Loop began in the early 1970s. Nationally renowned restaurant and music club Blueberry Hill was the first of a new era of unique owner-operated businesses. Then came record stores, a bookstore and more.

1980s

The non-profit St. Louis Walk of Fame was founded and became a unifying attraction for the area. Now more than 170 stars and informative plaques are embedded in the sidewalks!

1990s

The elegant 1924 Tivoli Movie Theatre was beautifully restored and, along with many new gift shops and clothing boutiques, signaled The Loop had arrived.

2000s

Opening in 2,000 was The Pageant, a 2,000+ capacity concert venue that has featured artists such as Bob Dylan, Sting, Imagine Dragons, Janelle Monåe, Robert Plant, Dolly Parton, and Tiffany Haddish.

Many consider The Loop the live music center of St. Louis with 6 stages on which you can enjoy music of all genres.

Pin-Up Bowl's intimate 8-lane bowling attraction debuted, followed by the AAA 4-diamond Moonrise Hotel that features 125 rooms plus the largest man-made moon rotating above the indoor-outdoor rooftop Twilight Room with its great views of St. Louis.

Get your photo with the 8-ft, in-motion Chuck Berry Statue, dedicated to the Father of Rock & Roll.

2010s

United Provisions Grocery opened featuring items from around the globe. The 750-capacity Delmar Hall music venue debuted highlighting performers from St. Louis and other cities and countries.

2020s

Swade Cannabis Dispensary opened in 2021 and in 2023 Magic Mini Golf wowed everyone with its 18 holes of indoor miniature golf, 2 indoor shuffleboard courts, and 5-car indoor Ferris wheel. Party on!

New shops, galleries and restaurants continue to open and intrigue. Enjoy the biggest variety of cuisine selections (50) from around the world - right here in the Delmar Loop. Yesss!




Discover under-the-radar and out-of-the-ordinary destinations in St. Louis

BELLEFONTAINE CEMETERY AND ARBORETUM

With more than 175 years of history, Bellefontaine Cemetery and Arboretum is not only a tranquil burial site but also a beloved local landmark and a shining example of environmental stewardship. Perched on a bluff overlooking the Mississippi River, the cemetery consists of 314 acres, containing more than 9,500 trees that represent 560 species. As you wander among the mature trees, take note of familiar names on some of the headstones, monuments and mausoleums. American explorer William Clark, writer and artist

William S. Burroughs and co-founder of Anheuser-Busch Adolphus
Busch are among the most notable people buried here, and you can
spot surnames that identify St. Louis buildings and parks, including
Barnes, Bixby, McMillan, Shaw and Wainwright. "We're always
uncovering new pieces of history," Sherry Smith, president and CEO
of Bellefontaine Cemetery and Arboretum, says, "and we get to share
that information with residents and visitors alike during tours and events
so that they can better understand how St. Louis culture evolved."



CAMPBELL HOUSE MUSEUM

Built in 1851 as the first house in the elegant Lucas Place neighborhood, the Campbell House Museum is a pristine time capsule that enlivens the history of St. Louis and Westward Expansion through the story of the Campbell family and their home. Renowned fur trader and entrepreneur Robert Campbell and various members of his family lived in the house from 1854 to 1938, and today, the museum still contains hundreds of their original possessions, including furniture, fixtures, paintings, clothing, family documents, carriages and a unique set of interior photographs taken in the mid-1880s when the house was the center of St. Louis society. In 1977, the Campbell House was listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and in 2005, the Campbell House Museum completed a meticulous, five-year restoration, returning the building to its opulent appearance.


CATHEDRAL BASILICA OF ST. LOUIS

More than a Roman Catholic Church, the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis is a distinguished work of art. With its lofty vaults and radiant mosaics, the sheer scale of the building's beauty is awe-inspiring. In its creation, more than a dozen architects' and artisans' concepts coalesced into a magnificently well-integrated and harmonious whole, and in 2023, a transformative lighting design project illuminated the interior, brightening the mosaics made of more than 30 million tesserae, artworks and architecture that visitors couldn't previously see in such detail. An interpretive approach was also used to highlight the cathedral's marble statues, drawing attention to elements that tell its story.

ENDANGERED WOLF CENTER

If asked to think of a wolf, what image comes to mind? The Big Bad Wolf in Little Red Riding Hood? The wolf who huffs and puffs and blows down houses in The Three Little Pigs? A werewolf? The Endangered Wolf Center in Eureka aims to dispel that negative imagery and promote the conservation of Mexican wolves and American red wolves by breeding and reintroducing them into the wild. Arguably the best-kept secret in the St. Louis area, the center offers a variety of daytime tours – from the signature endangered species tour to a specialized photography tour – as well as nighttime howls that teach guests about wolf communication.





CATHEDRAL BASILICA OF ST. LOUIS

FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT HOUSE IN EBSWORTH PARK

Immerse yourself in Frank Lloyd
Wright's distinctive design. Nestled on
more than 10 acres of grassy fields
beside a grove of persimmon trees
in Kirkwood, the Frank Lloyd Wright
House in Ebsworth Park was built for
Russell and Ruth Kraus in the 1950s,
and today, it remains an excellent
example of Wright's democratic vision

to provide middle-class Americans with beautiful architecture at an affordable cost. The 1,900-square-foot residence – one of Wright's Usonian homes – has a complex floor plan of intersecting parallelograms. Inside the house, tidewater red cypress lines the walls and ceilings, while red-hued concrete slabs cover the floors. Wandering from room to room, you'll encounter stained glass designed by Russell Kraus and beds shaped like parallelograms, alongside other zany features. Tours of the home are available yearround, and advance booking is recommended.

JEFFERSON BARRACKS TELEPHONE MUSEUM

Whether you remember rotary dial phones or not, you'll have a blast poking around the Jefferson Barracks Telephone Museum. The self-guided history museum in Jefferson Barracks Park has hands-on displays alongside an extensive collection of telephones manufactured from the late 1800s through 2012. Its exhibits also invite people to reminisce about the comical lack of privacy on a party line, the juvenile joy of three-way calling, the newfound freedom of cordless phones and other happy memories of telephonic communication. In the last room, don't miss the character telephone exhibit where phones take the shape of Snoopy, Pac-Man, the Keebler Elf, the Jolly Green Giant, bumper cars and corn on the cob.

SAINT LOUIS UNIVERSITY MUSEUM OF ART

One of the best university art museums in the U.S., the Saint Louis University Museum of Art boasts an impressive permanent collection of works by modern masters. Pop art by Andy Warhol, avant-garde glass by Dale Chihuly, paradoxical pieces by Roy Lichtenstein, abstract portraits from Chuck Close and more sit inside the stunning Beaux-Arts building, which dates to the turn of the 20th century.

SOLDIERS MEMORIAL MILITARY MUSEUM


Framed by four iconic Walker Hancock sculptures, Soldiers Memorial Military Museum honors local military service members, veterans and their families. Hidden in plain sight in downtown St. Louis, the state-of-the-art museum has been operated by the Missouri Historical Society since November 2015. With every exhibition, director Mikall Venso aims to put artifacts into context, illuminating their deeper meanings for visitors. Admission is always free, and exhibitions change over time.

ULYSSES S. GRANT NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

Known as the victorious Civil War general who saved the Union and the 18th President of the United States, Ulysses S. Grant married Julia Dent in 1848 and lived at her family home, White Haven, from 1854 to 1859. At the Ulysses S. Grant National Historic Site, watch the 22-minute orientation film, which provides more insights into Grant's military service and two terms as president, and

then take a guided tour of White Haven, which was run by an enslaved African American workforce before the Civil War. The park museum – which is housed in a historic horse stable designed by Grant features six permanent exhibits that dig deeper into the rich and varied history and culture of the area.

Traveling with kids? Don't miss Grant's Farm across the street!





THE WALLS OFF WASHINGTON

An inspirational backdrop for the Grand Center Arts District, The Walls Off Washington encompasses 20 murals, all within a walkable space accessed via Sophie's Artist Lounge. Tour the murals, beginning with Lift As You Climb, a vibrant work by Derrick Adams that depicts eyecatching figures helping each other climb colorful ladders to the top of the building, and don't miss J'Ai Deux Amours by C215, in which St. Louis native Josephine Baker wears beads and an endearing smile. "We're carefully curating this mural experience so that it shines a positive light on St. Louis," Gina Grafos, director and chief curator of visual and literal arts at Kranzberg Arts Foundation, says. "We believe St. Louis should be respected; it should be loved." Along with the art, you can enjoy a coffee drink from Blueprint Coffee at High Low, which provides the "canvas" for Kranzbergville, a playful mural that prolific international artist Kenny Scharf finished in 72 hours.

WORLD BIRD SANCTUARY

Soaring eagles, waddling pelicans and hooting owls draw ornithophiles and outdoor enthusiasts alike to this hidden gem. Encompassing more than 305 acres of hardwood forest and housing more than 200 birds of prey, World Bird Sanctuary teaches visitors about all manner of winged friends through one-of-a-kind wildlife experiences. The crows and ravens even put on a show that teaches people to recycle! The staff aims to deliver serious messages in fun ways while getting visitors to love the birds as much as they do. After all, we don't know where the next great naturalist will find inspiration. It could be a kid who meets an Egyptian vulture at World Bird Sanctuary.



The latter also has a walk-up counter operated by Hi-Pointe Drive-In, which specializes in hamburgers, french fries and milkshakes. At the newest tasting room in Kirkwood, you can feast on a selection of seafood from Peacemaker Lobster & Crab Co. in the beautifully landscaped backyard. No matter where you stop, you'll find an everevolving lineup of craft beer that will quench your cravings.

Sours put Alpha Brewing Co. on the map. Fruited and barrel-aged, its suds range from sour blonde ale brewed with tangerine to sour black ale aged in Pinot Noir barrels to sour raspberry blonde ale aged in oak foeders. At its bustling brewery and taproom in the Tower Grove South neighborhood, the kitchen dishes out chicken wings, smash burgers and patty melts, leaving you thirsty for more beer. Looking towards the future, Alpha Brewing Co. is committed to a sustainable business model. A proud member of the Green Dining Alliance, the company offers charging stations for electric cars, fills patio spaces with native plants and partners with New Earth Farm to compost organic waste. Last year, the company opened a second location at the Delmar Maker District, which focuses on spirits, such as Squoosh, a fruited vodka. Beer devotees need not worry, though; the "brewstillery" also has 10 taps dedicated to Alpha Brewing Co. suds.

Budweiser

Known as the King of Beers, Budweiser is brewed using a distinctive beechwood aging process that imparts smoothness and complexity to its flavor profile.



Anheuser-Busch

Founded in the 1850s as a small neighborhood brewery, Anheuser-Busch quickly transformed from a local fixture into a national presence. Today, it serves as a hub for brewing innovation, using the highest-quality ingredients grown by American farmers to produce umpteen brands of beer. St. Louis is home to the titan's flagship brewery, which operates out of historic, red-brick buildings. Hop on a tour for a glimpse inside them. Each tour explains the life of an Anheuser-Busch beer from seed to glass – the Finisher Tour will even give you a taste of beer straight from the finishing cellars – and they end at the Anheuser-Busch Biergarten where you can enjoy a cold one on the house!

FLAGSHIP PINT:

With a citrusy flavor and floral aroma, O.J. Run is a popular choice. The imperial hazy IPA is dry hopped with Citra, Galaxy and Amarillo.



Narrow Gauge

BREWING CO.

A delicious addition to Florissant, Narrow Gauge Brewing Co. has a robust lineup of lagers, ales, IPAs, porters, stouts and sours, so you're bound to find a brew that appeals to your palate. Curious quaffers might also consider the mixed fermentation bottles – each with its own intricate and exciting story. The Begin Anew Blend #5, for instance, is a sour blonde ale, foeder-fermented and wine barrel-aged for 15 months. It was then aged on a bed of boysenberries and red and black currants for an additional nine months before it was bottled. Melomel, a type of mead fermented with clover honey and a variety of fresh fruits – think boysenberries, cherries, black currants and marionberries – is also sold in bottles at the brewery's new taproom. What will you try first?

FLAGSHIP PINT: PaleAle

Easy to drink, refreshing and satisfying, Schlafly's Pale Ale is the original session beer. It was born of heritage and artistry, giving imbibers a taste of the brewery's genuine approach to producing great beer.



Schlafly Beer

Difficult to say but easy to love, Schlafly is a craft beer pioneer in the city with the country's best beer scene. Although meticulous about consistency, the brewery is in a constant state of exploration, and its repertoire of more than 60 styles of beer ranges from classic to experimental. Enjoy pale ale, oatmeal stout, raspberry hefeweizen, Mexican lager and more at the historic Schlafly Tap Room in Downtown West or Schlafly Bottleworks in Maplewood. The company also distributes beer in 17 states, if you want to stock your fridge.

Side Project

BREWING

Praised for its funky, experimental brews, Side Project Brewing has a long list of accolades. In 2020 and 2023, RateBeer named it the No. 2 brewery in the world; in 2015, Side Project Cellar – the company's Belgian-inspired beer, wine and spirits bar – earned a James Beard Award nomination for Outstanding Bar Program; and in 2014, Forbes put Side Project's executive chef, Adam Altnether, on its list of 30 under 30. There's no question that the brewery pushes the boundaries of the region's beverage scene, and it wants to continue to evolve and move forward. You can get a taste of Side Project's creations at any of its three locations – The Cellar, The Brewery and The Patio – all of which are located in Maplewood. With ever-changing taps, there's no "flagship pint," but you can dream about a wine barrel-aged tart withour with orange peel and coriander and a Brettanomyces (wild yeast strain) pale ale aged in oak with calamansi, Tanzania and Madagascar vanilla and toasted coconut.





Accessible and entertaining, St. Louis is a one-of-a-kind wonderland where youngsters – and the young at heart – can explore our Great Rivers, climb to new heights and encounter adorable animals. If you only have two days in St. Louis, these are the highlights to hit.

After a restful night in a comfortable hotel, pop into Chris'
Pancake & Dining for brunch with your brood. Once you get
your fill of flapjacks, drive the short distance to Forest Park
where adventure awaits at free attractions such as the Saint
Louis Science Center and the Saint Louis Zoo.

The former specializes in "aha!" moments, encouraging inquisitive visitors to test the laws of physics, inspect an animatronic Tyrannosaurus rex and escape to outer space via the James S. McDonnell Planetarium. It's also a great option for rainy travel days.



At the latter, kids can roam, run and revel alongside swinging monkeys, squawking penguins, strutting giraffes and splashing bears. For an experience unlike any other, book a behind-thescenes tour – just imagine wading with rays, feeding black rhinoceros and snapping selfies with giant tortoises, among other extraordinary experiences.

Across the street, **Turtle Playground** is a magnet for little kids with a lot of energy, as they get to clamber on the backs of giant reptiles. Represented in concrete are a common snapping turtle, softshell

turtle, red-eared slider, Mississippi map turtle, stinkpot turtle and three box turtles, plus seven oversized turtle eggs and a long, sinuous snake that appears to be taking a bite out of the nearby overpass.

LONE ELK PARK

It's a deer. It's a bison. It's a wild turkey! This 546-acre wildlife management area offers frequent wildlife sightings whether you drive or walk through the park.

MISSOURI HISTORY MUSEUM

Explore the storied history of St. Louis, from its founding in 1764 to the 1904 World's Fair to our present-day metropolis.



Now that you have a feel for the region – and what your family wants to do – you can go in a few different directions. If it's a nice day, start at the Missouri Botanical Garden. Beloved by locals for its beauty and vibrancy, it also has one of the best playgrounds in St. Louis, which introduces kids to the significance of plants and nature in fun and innovative ways. 





Your artsy itinerary will change with the season. Spring ushers in Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, which has become one of the most progressive opera companies in the world. Encompassing four productions sung in English with projected English subtitles, its annual festival season proves that opera can be innovative, inclusive and fun; it can feel truly alive. The sets, costumes, melodies, singing and acting all harmonize to tell a story, inviting you into a surprising new world.

Summer then offers arts al fresco at the St. Louis
Shakespeare Festival and The Muny – the latter being
a regular destination for my family – and winter urges
you indoors to marvel at work by the Contemporary Art
Museum St. Louis, Jazz St. Louis and Saint Louis
Dance Theatre.

Although there's a seasonality to our arts scene, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra performs from September through June, accommodating most visitors with our vast programming. Throughout the year, we also partner with arts organizations such as the Pulitzer Arts Foundation and The Sheldon Concert Hall and Art Galleries to put on concerts at their venues, where attendees can get an extra dose of arts and culture.

As a resident of St. Louis, I love exploring different neighborhoods and experiencing the art that they house. The Kirkwood Performing Arts Center, where STAGES St. Louis performs from June through October, is in my backyard, and I really enjoy going there as well

St. Louis sustains an astoundingly high quality of art, and our arts-and-culture scene is remarkably innovative. We consistently produce new creations that are the envy of other communities, and we make them accessible to residents and visitors alike. I'm so proud of the creative work that we do collectively.

If you have kids like mine, they'll love the free cultural attractions in Forest Park, including the Saint Louis Art Museum, Missouri History Museum and Saint Louis Zoo. If it's your first visit, prepare to be blown away! Even if you've been 100 times, there's always something new to discover.

Laumeier Sculpture Park is another unique attraction where you can get up close and personal with these large-scale sculptures in this beautiful park. Every year over Mother's Day weekend, it also hosts an art fair that showcases 150 juried artists from across the country and their phenomenal work.

St. Louis is a hotbed of creation. Whether you're interested in art, music, theater or dance, you'll find work here that has an impact on the national arts-and-culture scene.

If you want to learn more about St. Louis' historic architecture and iconic structures, its famous landmarks and overlooked treasures, book a tour with **Landmarks Downtown Walking Tours**, which also focuses on the art of historic preservation.


FEEL THE POWER OF MUSIC AT POWELL HALL

I'm always ready to talk about the arts – that's my thing! I have to start with the upcoming productions by Saint Louis Dance Theatre, including two world premieres, as they're wonderful opportunities for anyone in St. Louis to see a high caliber of contemporary dance. Last year, we partnered with Jazz St. Louis to put an exciting spin on Duke Ellington's Nutcracker Suite, so I also encourage folks to get tickets to Jazz at the Bistro where they can hear good music and eat good food.

For more performing arts, look to **The St. Louis Black Repertory Company.** Founder and producing director Ron Himes produces, commissions and reimagines work written by Black playwrights, and every year, he stages incredible theater productions that provide a moving cultural experience to a diverse audience. **The Muny**, a massive outdoor theater in Forest Park, presents a magnificent lineup of musicals every summer, too. I always have a good time when I go there.

The Saint Louis Art Museum has planned some incredible exhibitions for the 2025 season, as well. Min Jung Kim, the Barbara B. Taylor Director of the Saint Louis Art Museum, has done a phenomenal job of curating beautiful, cultural artwork that will be on display right here.

As you explore the region, I can almost guarantee that you'll come across some of our public art. One of my favorite pieces is at **Energizer Park**, where St. Louis CITY SC plays. It's called Pillars of the Valley, and it's inspired by the people who lived in Mill Creek Valley, one of whom was Josephine Baker.

If you love art, music, dance, theater – or all of the above – St. Louis is an ideal destination. I moved from New York City to St. Louis because of the vastness of the arts here, and along with my counterparts at other organizations, I'm committed to our arts-and-culture ecosystem. Every day, we find new ways to expand our offerings and remove barriers so that everyone can experience them.

LEAH MERRIMAN

OWNER OF GREEN DOOR ART GALLERY

As the new owner, I have to recommend **Green Door Art Gallery** in Webster Groves. The gallery features work by 36 resident artists, making it a great place to experience local art. If you're visiting in September, don't miss the **Old Webster Jazz & Blues Festival**, which soulful bluesman Marquise Knox has headlined for the last few years. It's possibly the most family-friendly music festival on the planet, and not surprisingly, it's free!

If you want to see international old masters, the Saint Louis Art Museum is your best bet. The museum's expansive collection is always free, and its special exhibitions are free on Fridays. For contemporary art, I encourage everyone to check out the rotating exhibitions at 21c Museum Hotel St. Louis and Angad Arts Hotel. You don't have to stay at the hotels to enjoy the artwork – although, the rooms are sensational. At Angad Arts Hotel, you can even choose the color of your room!

I also have to give a shout-out to **Third Degree Glass Factory**, which hosted my first significant solo exhibition. Whether you want to shop for handmade glass art or take a glassblowing class, it's worth a stop.

It might seem like an unlikely suggestion, but the **Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis** is another great spot for art lovers. It houses the largest collection of mosaics in the world outside Russia, and in the basement, the Mosaic Museum uses depictions of the design and the installation to explain how they were created.

Outside the Cathedral Basilica, St. Louis architecture is fascinating. When you drive through other cities, they're so beige, both literally and figuratively. St. Louis pops with various shades of red and brown brick. If you love bricks as much as I do – my favorite documentary, Brick By Chance and Fortune, tells the story of brick in St. Louis – walk around neighborhoods such as Laclede's Landing, Soulard and The Hill.

I've spent a lot of hours at Arkadin Cinema & Bar, and if you're a film fanatic like me, you'll want to visit St. Louis during one of our film festivals. The St. Louis Filmmakers Showcase as well as the St. Louis International Film Festival are highlights of our yearly event calendar.




For live music, I'm drawn to more intimate venues such as **Delmar Hall** and **The Pageant**, while **Hollywood Casino Amphitheatre** – **St. Louis** and
